

What your investment provides


You provide a 4-stance Latrine block at school with a hand washing station. Girls have separate toilets, which provides them with dignity, safety and discretion. Children also receive education on hygiene.

Excavations and Earthworks:

- Clear site of all vegetations, shrubs and debris and cart away
- Excavate pits from 1.5m-6.0m deep
- Build retaining wall 300mm thick burnt brick pit lining wall in c/s mortar (1:3), damp proofing

Formwork includes:

- 200mm thick concrete base slab
- 300x200 mm thick retaining wall & mid beam
- Steel bar reinforcement: assorted sizes needed
- Return, fill and ram excavated material or marrum on the sides of retaining wall, access ramps



Example of 4-pit latrine building plan

Structure, Walls & Roof

- 60 x 200mm thick solid concrete blocks or burnt clay bricks masonry built to courses in cement/sand (1:3) mortar with flush joints reinforced with 32 x 2mm hoop iron every alternate course
- 8 x Lintol Beams, vibrated reinforced concrete beam hoisted to position
- 2 x Vent Pipes, Supply and fix 3000mm length, 100mm diameter heavy duty PVC vent pipes with caps
- 20 x Pre-painted Iron sheets, 17 x trusses, 14 x Wall plates, 35 x Purlins, 3 x Hoop Iron
- 20 x Rot proof Fascia Board, Paint 3 x coats
- 25mm thick cement sand mortar
 (1:3) plaster/render for walls

Doors & Windows

- 4 x Mild Steel Panel doors single opening door size 2050 x 860mm to approved pattern, complete with fixing lugs, ironmongery etc
- Prepare and apply three coats gloss oil paint on metalwork
- 4 x Supply and fix single sash windows complete with 5mm thick translucent glass fixed with putty, including locking mechanism

Floors & Sanitary Fittings

- Floor paving Cement and sand (1:3) screed, steel trowelled
- 2 x W.C. Squatting pan
- 1 x W.C Seating pan complete with hand rails support for persons with disability
- 4 x Toilet roll holder
- 3 x Soap dish
- Hand washing facility concrete, taps, pipes, rails



CASE STUDY

"We'll be happy to go to school"

Name: Elizabeth Lives: South Sudan

"There are 26 male teachers at my school and no

female teachers.

Many girls and children must travel 2 hours each way to school, starting at 6am without any breakfast and leaving school again at 4pm.

My mother told me about getting periods. I feared when going to school that it will show.

The lack of proper toilets made it difficult to change during school hours. Often it was easier to just stay at home.

My mother heard about the LWF training and told me to go as they would help me.

I learnt how to use the menstrual cup. I like using it. Now I can save money because I don't have to buy the 'Always' pads.

I can use this money to go towards my school fees.

If we get the new latrines, it will make it more private and easier for us girls. We will be happy to go to school.

I would like to finish Senior School, because I think school is important.

If there was an opening, I would like to work for LWF and raise awareness about the importance of latrines for girls - and help teach other girls."

"I thank God for the courage of those like you who give money to help us here in South Sudan.

We are in poverty, but you are empowering us to do something for ourselves.

Your impact: ALWayS for the forgotten

South Sudan is one of the poorest countries in the world, ranking 192 out of 193 countries on the UN Human Development Index.

Civil war and prolonged floods, coupled with periods of drought, threaten the fragile social system. This creates huge challenges, both for people's livelihoods and their food security.

In fact, two thirds of people in South Sudan do not know where their next meal will come from.

At the same time, millions of displaced South Sudanese are returning home to rebuild their lives and their country. They desperately need sustainble sources of income.

Women are especially vulnerable as they are often forced to work dangerous jobs to support their family.

This includes jobs like gathering firewood and making charcoal, which mean they are often alone in the forest at night and at risk of attack or even rape.

ALWS supports an **integrated**, **community-based empowerment** and **rights-based approach** while working as part of a **global partnership**.



Taking an integrated approach to development work means working across different sectors. For example, if you build a school, but there's no road to get there, housing for teachers, or clean water, the school won't be very useful!



A **community-based empowerment approach** gives people the training and support to make their own decisions about the development in their community. This means they then have responsibility for the activities, and grow the confidence needed to become self-sufficient.



A **rights-based approach** recognises community members as rights-holders. Your support empowers people to claim their rights, while at the same time, develop the capacity of those in power to meet their obligations.


