




| What you give | One month of teacher training for a refugee teacher |

| Who you help | 100,000 children (across both Kakuma and Dadaab Refugee Camps) 13 pre-primary + 21 primary + 21 junior schools = 55 schools in total |
| Why your help is needed | It's critical that refugee children can access safe, quality education Challenges to achieving this include: overcrowded schools e.g. 7 learners per desk designed for 3 over-age enrolment, because children have missed out on so much around 30% of school-aged children not in school shortage of learning materials e.g. ratio of 1:5 textbook to student severe shortage of teachers, because very difficult working conditions low or no salary lack of accommodation and transport security concerns big classes (100+) high turnover |
| How your gift changes lives | You give children a gift no-one can take away - an education! Quality schooling gives children the best chance to break free from poverty PLUS school provides so many other benefits: like fun, friends, structure, and protection from abuse and exploitation |

CASE STUDY

3,000 students, 1 teacher, and you!

James is a primary school teacher you support at Kakuma Refugee Camp. He teaches Agriculture in a school of more than 3,000 students!

Before being employed by ALWS' partner LWF as a teacher, James was struggling to make a living:

"The only income activity I was involved in was coaching for learners who were performing poorly. They were giving me a little motivation.

LWF has given me a chance to take part in various teacher trainings. You'll be trained on different skills like strategies of teaching."

James says teaching has turned his life around. He works hard to create change in his community:

"The teacher training has helped me personally and also given me skills to tackle issues in the community. For example, if I find a child being harassed somewhere I know what to do."

Helping children in the community is one of the reasons James decided to become a teacher. He'd love to do further study, but can't afford it.

James also shares some of the challenges that come with having 3,000 learners in one school ...

... like overcrowded classrooms, not enough texbooks, and difficulty helping every student:

"The support that I can suggest is more textbooks and if possible, exercise books ... because some students cannot afford even a single book."
